Checklist of Butterflies

Beautiful, graceful, and delicate are words often used to describe butterflies. Their life cycles and migration habits are fascinating studies in natural history. Unique habitats of Mount Magazine, highest point in Arkansas, are very attractive to butterflies. Over ninety species have been identified here. This mountain is an excellent place for beginning and experienced butterfly watchers to observe these wonderful insects.

Carry field guides, binoculars, hand lenses, cameras and a picnic lunch for a day of identifying as many butterflies as possible. Walk nature trails through various habitats and abundant wildflowers. Discover eggs, caterpillars and chrysalises, as well as adults. Search for Diana fritillaries in one of few isolated populations where they are found. Watch as Monarchs wing their way southward to winter in Mexican mountains.

Attend the annual Mount Magazine International Butterfly Festival held in June. During this event, fun and educational activities will be available for nature lovers of all ages.

More data on butterfly populations is needed. You can help by leaving a copy of your observations at the visitor center. Collecting is not allowed in Arkansas State Parks.

Common names in this list follow *The Common Names of North American Butterflies* by Jacqueline Miller, 1992, Smithsonian Institution Press. Some names which butterfly enthusiasts may be more familiar with are shown [in brackets] following their new common names. Flight dates after each species are for Mount Magazine. This checklist complements the Arkansas Butterfly Checklist also compiled by Lori Spencer of the Ozark Natural Science Center.

Butterfly Behavior

Butterflies are fascinating creatures to observe. Each year, as habitats and climates change, butterfly populations fluctuate. Butterfly enthusiasts often provide professionals with much-needed data from checklists. You can help track and maintain data by using this checklist when you visit Arkansas's State Parks. Simply give this checklist to the park interpreter or mail it to the address below.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR:

Feeding:

Butterflies drink with a long, straw-like tube called a proboscis. Was the butterfly...

- Puddling, drinking liquids from damp ground, sand, or other source?
- Drinking nectar from flowers? Observe the flower species, color, height, and shape.

Flight:

- Flight slow, graceful, soaring?
- Flight short, erratic pattern?

Thermoregulation:

Butterflies are cold-blooded and must rely on the temperature of their environment to warm flight muscles. Butterflies orient their wings to the sun, a behavior called basking.

- Dorsal basking (wings open to the sun)
- Lateral basking (wings closed, tilted 90° to sun)

Mating:

Mating behavior is poorly understood and seldom observed.

- Patrolling down a trail—males patrol in search of females.
- Patrolling down a road—males patrol in search of females.
- Hilltopping—unmated females fly to hilltops in search of males.
- Courtship—females accepting or rejecting males
- Mating—may last several hours, one sex may fly off carrying the other
